 - A. Clive Staples Lewis
 - B. Born in Belfast, Ireland in 1898. Died 1963.
 - C. Fought in Somne, France in WWI
 - D. Became professor at Magdalen College, Oxford
 - E. Atheist until 1929, then Christian in 1931. (Lewis' *Surprised by Joy* is the story of coming to know Jesus Christ.)

 F. Member of "Inklings" — Writers like JRR Tolkien and Charles Williams

 - G. Wrote Chronicles of Narnia starting in 1950
 - H. Based on his hosting of 3 evacuee children during WWII. For his goddaughter, Lucy.
